## WoundStat Superior in Hemostatic Comparison

SAN DIEGO — WoundStat, a hemostatic agent approved in August 2007, is superior to other combat hemostatic agents used for combat and civilian trauma, results from a swine study demonstrated.

The product, marketed by TraumaCure Inc., consists of a pure granular smectite composite. In the study, it produced hemostasis in the face of high-pressure arterial bleeding within 3 minutes. WoundStat is currently used as a life-saving tool by the U.S. military in Afghanistan.

"The study protocol was to hold for 3 minutes, but in subsequent studies and observations, 2 minutes was more than sufficient for WoundStat to stop the hemorrhage," Robert F. Diegelmann, Ph.D., said at the annual meeting of the Wound Healing Society. It also would be simple for the victim or medic to apply.

Dr. Diegelmann, professor of biochem-

istry and molecular biology, anatomy, and emergency medicine at Virginia Commonwealth University, Richmond, led the research team that developed WoundStat at the university's reanimation engineering shock center.

He and his associates compared the performance of WoundStat with Z-Medica Corp.'s QuikClot zeolite granules and QuikClot zeolite Advance Clotting Sponge, HemCon Medical Technologies Inc.'s chitosan bandage, and the U.S. Army field gauze bandage in a lethal vascular injury model developed by the Army (J. Trauma 2007;63:276-84). The protocol involved creating a 6-mm arteriotomy in a vessel of 25 male swine. After 45 seconds of hemorrhage, five animals each were randomized to be treated with the Army field bandage (control group), QuikClot zeolite granules, the QuikClot zeolite Advance Clotting Sponge, the HemCon chitosan bandage, or WoundStat.

Treatment of latent tuberculosis in patients with a reactive tuberculin test reduces the risk of tuberculosis reactivation in patients receiving TNF blockers. Some patients who tested negative for latent tuberculosis prior to receiving ENBREL have developed active tuberculosis. Physicians should monitor patients receiving ENBREL for signs and symptoms of active tuberculosis, including patients who tested negative for latent tuberculosis infection.

Many of these serious infections occurred in patients predisposed to infection because of concomitant immunosuppressive therapy and/or their underlying disease. Do not start ENBREL in the presence of sepsis, active infections (including chronic or localized), or allergy to ENBREL or its components. Use caution in patients predisposed to infection, such as those with advanced or poorly controlled diabetes.

### Neurologic Events

TNF inhibitors, including ENBREL, have been associated with rare cases of new onset or exacerbation of CNS demyelinating disorders (some presenting with mental status changes and some associated with permanent disability). Transverse myelitis, optic neuritis, multiple sclerosis, and cases of new onset or exacerbation of seizure disorders have been observed in association with ENBREL therapy. The causal relationship to ENBREL therapy remains unclear. Exercise caution when considering ENBREL for patients with these disorders.

### **Hematologic Events**

Rare cases of pancytopenia, including aplastic anemia, some fatal, have been reported. The causal relationship to ENBREL therapy is unclear. Exercise caution in patients who have a previous history of significant hematologic abnormalities. Advise patients to seek immediate medical attention if they develop signs or symptoms of blood dyscrasias or infection. Consider discontinuing ENBREL if significant hematologic abnormalities are confirmed.

### Malignancies

In clinical trials of all TNF inhibitors, more cases of lymphoma were seen compared to control patients. The risk of lymphoma may be up to several-fold higher in RA and psoriasis patients; the role of TNF inhibitors in the development of malignancies is unknown. In clinical trials, the incidence of malignancies other than lymphoma has not increased with exposure to ENBREL and is similar to what would be expected in the general population.

### **Hepatitis B Reactivation**

TNF inhibitors, including ENBREL, have been associated with reactivation of hepatitis B virus (HBV) in chronic carriers of this virus. The majority of these reports occurred in patients on concomitant immunosuppressive agents, which may also contribute to HBV reactivation. Prescribers should exercise caution in prescribing TNF blockers for patients identified as carriers of HBV.

### **Adverse Events**

The most commonly reported adverse events in RA clinical trials were injection site reaction, infection, and headache. In clinical trials of all other adult indications, adverse events were similar to those reported in RA clinical trials.



mixed composite available in 5.5-ounce packages, also involved the application of 200 mm Hg pressure over the product in the wound for 3 minutes.

In all swine, fluid resuscitation began at the time each product was applied, with 500 mL of Hextend, followed by lactated Ringer's solution at 100 mL/min to achieve and maintain a mean arterial blood pressure of 65 mm Hg. The study's primary end points were survival, survival time, posttreatment blood loss, and amount of resuscitation fluid required.

All swine in the WoundStat group survived to 180 minutes and required only a

single application, Dr. Diegelmann said at the meeting, held in conjunction with a symposium on advanced wound care. One animal in the HemCon chitosan bandage group survived, but none of the animals in the other groups survived.

He reported that survival and survival times for animals in the WoundStat group were significantly greater, compared with those in all other groups. In addition, posttreatment blood loss and lost-resuscitation fluid volume were significantly less for animals in the WoundStat group, compared with all other groups.

In the controlled and open-label portions of clinical trials of ENBREL<sup>®</sup>, 9 lymphomas were observed in 5723 patients over approximately 11201 patient years of therapy. This is 3-fold higher than that expected in the general population. While patients with heumatoid arthritis or psoriasis, particularly those with highly active disease, may be at a higher risk (up to several fold) for the development of lymphoma, the potential role of TNF-blocking therapy in the development of malignancies is not known (see **ADVERSE REACTIONS: Malignancies**).<sup>11,2</sup>

REACTIONS: Malignancies).<sup>11,12</sup> In a randomized, placebo-controlled study of 180 patients with Wegener's granulomatosis where ENBREL® was added to standard treatment (including cyclophosphamide, methotrexate, and corticosteroids), patients receiving ENBREL® experienced more ono-cutaneous solid malignancies than patients receiving placebo (see **ADVERSE REACTIONS: Malignancies**). The addition of ENBREL® to standard treatment was not associated with improved clinical outcomes when compared with standard therapy alone. The use of ENBREL® in patients with Wegener's granulomatosis receiving immunosuppressive agenet is not recommended. The use of ENBREL® in patients receiving concurrent cyclophosphamide therapy is not recommended.

Hepatitis B Virus Reactivation Use of TNF blockers, including ENBREL®, has been associated with reactivation of hepatitis B virus (HBV) in patients who are chronic carriers of this virus. In some instances, HBV reactivation occurring in conjunction with TNF blocker therapy has been fatal. The majority of these reports have occurred in patients concomitantly receiving other medications that suppress the immune system, which may also contribute to HBV reactivation. Patients at risk for HBV infection should be evaluated for prior evidence of HBV infection before initiating TNF blocker fore patients identified as carriers of HBV. Adequate data are not available on the safety or efficacy of treating mainents who are carriers of HBV with anti-viral therapy in conjunction Adequate data are not available on the safety or efficacy of treating patients who are carriers of HBV with anti-viral therapy in conjunction with TNF blocker therapy to prevent HBV reactivation. Patients who are carriers of HBV and require treatment with ENBREL® should be closely monitored for clinical and laboratory signs of active HBV infection throughout therapy and for several months following termination of therapy. ### PRECAUTIONS General

Allergic reactions associated with administration of ENBREL® during clinical trials have been reported in < 2% of patients. If an anaphylactic reaction or other serious allergic reaction occurs, administration of ENBREL® should be discontinued immediately and appropriate therapy initiated.

Caution: The needle cap on the prefilled syringe and on the SureClick" autoinjector contains dry natural rubber (a derivative of latex) which may cause allergic reactions in individuals sensitive to latex.

Information for Patients Patients or their caregivers should be provided the ENBREL® "Medication Guide" and provided an opportunity to read it and ask questions prior to initiation of therapy. The health care provider should ask the patient questions to determine any risk factors for treatment. Patients developing signs and symptoms of infection should seek medical evaluation immediately.

medical evaluation immediately. Latex Sensitivity Allergies ENBREL® is provided as a single-use prefilled syringe, a single-use prefilled SureClick<sup>TM</sup> autoinjector, or a multiple-use vial. The patient or caregiver should be informed that the needle cap on the prefilled syringe and on the SureClick<sup>TM</sup> autoinjector contains dry natural rubber (a derivative of latex), which should not be handled by persons sensitive to latex.

### . Administration of ENBREL®

Administration of ENBREL® If a patient or caregiver is to administer ENBREL®, the patient or caregiver should be instructed in injection techniques and how to measure and administer the correct dose (see the ENBREL® (etanercept) "Medication Guide"). The first injection should be performed under the supervision of a qualified health care professional. The patient's or caregiver's ability to inject subcutaneously should be assessed. Patients and caregivers should be instructed in the technique as well as proper syringe and needle disposal, and be cautioned against reuse of needles and syringes. A puncture-resistant container for disposal of needles, syringes, and autoinjectors should be used. If the product is intended for multiple use, additional syringes, needles, and alcohol swabs will be required. Patients with Heart Failure

additional syringes, needles, and alcohol swabs will be required. **Patients with Heart Failure** Two large clinical trials evaluating the use of ENBREL® in the treatment of heart failure were terminated early due to lack of efficacy. Results of one study suggested higher mortality in patients treated with ENBREL® compared to placebo. Results of the second study did not corroborate these observations. Analyses did not identify specific factors associated with increased risk of adverse outcomes in heart failure patients treated with ENBREL® (see **ADVERSE REACTIONS: Patients with Heart Failure**). There have been post-marketing reports of worsening of congestive heart failure (CHF), with and without identifiable precipitating factors, in patients taking ENBREL®. There have also been rare reports of new onset CHF, including CHF in patients

without known preexisting cardiovascular disease. Some of these patients have been under 50 years of age. Physicians should exercise caution when using ENBREL<sup>®</sup> in patients who also have heart failure, and monitor patients carefully.

and monitor patients carefully. *Immunosuppression* Anti-TNF therapies, including ENBREL®, affect host defenses against infections and malignancies since TNF mediates inflammation and modulates cellular immune responses. In a study of 49 patients with RA treated with ENBREL®, there was no evidence of depression of delayed-type hypersensitivity, depression of immunoglobulin levels, or change in enumeration of effector cell populations. The impact of treatment with ENBREL® on the development and course of malignancies, as well as active and/or chronic infections, ison fully understood (see WARNINGS: Malignancies, ADVERSE REACTIONS: Infections, and Malignancies). The safety and efficacy of ENBREL® in patients with immunosuppression or chronic infections have not been evaluated. *Immunizations* 

immunosuppression or chronic infections nave not been evaluated. Immunizations Most psoriatic arthritis patients receiving ENBREL® were able to mount effective B-cell immune responses to pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine, but titres in aggregate were moderately lower and fewer patients had two-fold rises in itters compared to patients not receiving ENBREL®. The clinical significance of this is unknown. Patients receiving ENBREL® may receive concurrent vaccinations, except for live vaccines. No data are available on the secondary transmission of infection by live vaccines in patients receiving ENBREL® (see **PRECAUTIONS: Immunosuppression**). It is recommended that JIA patients. if possible, be brought up to

I RECONTINNEL IMMUNOSUPPRESSION). It is recommended that JJA patients, if possible, be brought up to date with all immunizations in agreement with current immunization guidelines prior to initiating EMBREL® therapy. Patients with a significant exposure to varicella virus should temporarily discontinue ENBREL® therapy and be considered for prophylactic treatment with Varicella Zoster Immune Globulin. Autoimmunity

Autoimmunity Treatment with ENBREL® may result in the formation of autoantibodies (see ADVERSE REACTIONS: Autoantibodies) and, rarely, in the development of a lupus-like syndrome or autoimmune hepatitis (see ADVERSE REACTIONS: Adverse Reaction Information from Contensional Paperley Which may resolve following withdrawal of Spontaneous Reports), which may resolve following withdrawal of ENBREL®. If a patient develops symptoms and findings suggestive of a lupus-like syndrome or autoimmune hepatitis following treatment with ENBREL®, treatment should be discontinued and the patient should be carefully evaluated.

# Specific drug interaction studies have not been conducted with ENBREL<sup>®</sup>, However, it was observed that the pharmacokinetics of ENBREL<sup>®</sup> was unaltered by concomitant methotrexate in rheumatoic arthritis patients.

In a study in which patients with active RA were treated for up to 24 weeks with concurrent ENBREL<sup>®</sup> and anakinra therapy, a 7% rate of serious infections was observed, which was higher than that observed with ENBREL<sup>®</sup> alone (0%) (see also **WARNINGS**). Two percent of patients treated concurrently with ENBREL<sup>®</sup> and anakinra developed neutropenia (ANC < 1 x 10<sup>o</sup>/L).

neutropenia (ANC < 1 x 10<sup>7</sup>L). In a study of patients with Wegener's granulomatosis, the addition of ENBREL<sup>®</sup> to standard therapy (including cyclophosphamide) was associated with a higher incidence of non-outaneous solid malignancies. The use of ENBREL<sup>®</sup> in patients receiving concurrent cyclophosphamide therapy is not recommended (see WARNINGS: Malignancies and ADVERSE REACTIONS: Malignancies).

Patients in a clinical study who were on established therapy with sulfasalazine, to which ENBREL® was added, were noted to develop a mild decrease in mean neutrophil counts in comparison to groups treated with either ENBREL® or sulfasalazine alone. The clinical significance of this observation is unknown.

Significance of this observation is unknown. Carcinogenesis, Mutagenesis, and Impairment of Fertility Long-term animal studies have not been conducted to evaluate the carcinogenic potential of ENBREL® or its effect on fertility. Mutagenesis studies were conducted in vitro and in vivo, and no evidence of mutagenic activity was observed.

Pregnancy (Category B) Developmental toxicity studies have been performed in rats and rabbits at doses ranging from 60- to 100- fold higher than the human dose and have revealed no evidence of harm to the fetus due to ENBREL®. There are, however, no studies in pregnant women. Because animal reproduction studies are not always predictive of human response, this drug should be used during pregnancy only if clearly needed.

Crearly needed. Pregnancy Registry: To monitor outcomes of pregnant women exposed to ENBREL®, a pregnancy registry has been established. Physicians are encouraged to register patients by calling 1-877-311-8972.

Nursing Mothers It is not known whether ENBREL® is excreted in human milk or absorbed systemically after ingestion. Because many drugs and immunoglobulins are excreted in human milk, and because of the potential for serious adverse reactions in nursing infants from ENBREL®, a decision should be made whether to discontinue nursing or to discontinue the drug.



Geriatric Use A total of 480 RA patients and 89 plaque psoriasis patients ages 65 years or older have been studied in clinical trials. No overall differences in safety or effectiveness were observed between these patients and younger patients. Because there is a higher incidence of infections in the elderly population in general, caution should be used in treating the elderly.

Pediatric Use ENBREL® is indicated for treatment of polyarticular-course juvenile idiopathic arthritis in patients ages 2 and older. Adverse Heactions in Adult Patients with IA, Psoriatic Arthritis, Ankylosing Spondylitis. or Plaque Psoriasis ENBREL® has been studied in 1442 patients with RA, followed for up to 80 months, in 169 patients with psoriatic arthritis for up to 24 months, in 222 patients with ankylosing spondylitis for up to 10 months, and 1261 patients with plaque psoriasis for up to 15 months. In controlled trials, the proportion of ENBREL®-treated patients who discontinued treatment due to adverse events was approximately 4% in the indications studied.
