A general review of the pathophysiology of this problem identifies numerous etiologic factors, such as dietary indiscretion, cardiac arrhythmias, pulmonary emboli, inter-current cardiac lesions and biochemical alterations. The importance of renal hemodynamics in the management and control of congestive heart failure is noted, and a treatment regimen found to be reasonably successful is outlined. This presentation addresses itself primarily to the rationale and conduct of the management of a serious problem and shows excellent quality and depth of understanding of this problem. The absence of any reference to the natural history of the development of this disease, concepts of prevention and psychosocial determinents somewhat diminishes its comprehensiveness, but it is still recommended as an excellent presentation.	<i>Laurel G.
