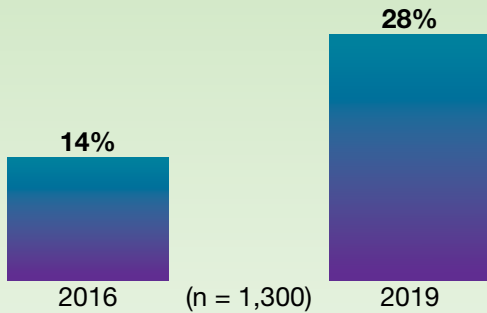


Telemedicine growth in the United States

From 2016 to 2019 the number of physicians reporting televisits doubled

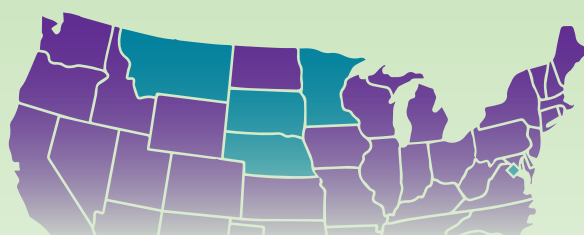


In 2018, 47.6% of 4,711 hospitals reported providing telehealth-based services



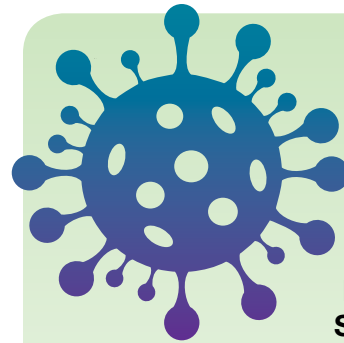
In 2019,

In March 2020, the COVID-19 Telehealth Program, as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, was passed, including \$200 million for health services connectivity improvement
